Church marking its centennial June 10

All Around Schomberg

Emmanuel Presbyterian Church in Schomberg will celebrate its 100th anniversary June 10.

The service will be held at the usual time of 9:30 a.m., and will include special music.

The congregation was organized in 1891 at Monkman's Church, about three miles northwest of Schomberg on the 3rd Line

of New Tecumseth. When Monkman's Church closed, the congregation moved to Schomberg and held services in Simpson's Hall (also known as Temperance Hall), which was located across the street from the present site of the CIBC parking lot.

The Baptist church was rented in 1907, and was purchased in 1927.

In June 1907, the first service was held at the present site on Main Street.

Child care subsidies feeling pressure

Growth in child population and an increase in number of low-income families are putting pressure on funding for child care fee subsidies in York Region.

In 2006, an average of 3,264 children were subsidized per month by the Region. There are 24,994 licensed centre-based and 640 home-based child care spaces in York.

While the number of spaces covered by purchase of service agreements has increased, the percentage of all licensed spaces for which provincial child care fee subsidy is available has decreased from 17 per cent to 10.4 per cent between 1999 and 2006.

As a result, the Region reports the current level of provincial funding for fee subsidy does not meet the community needs.

Class Environmental Assessment (Class EA) and Water Resource Exploration for
Water Supply and Storage in the Community of Nobleton

The Regional Municipality of York is undertaking a project to identify the preferred solution and design concept for provision of additional water supply and storage capacity to meet the planned growth of the Community of Nobleton. This project will be conducted in compliance with the Nobleton Community Plan (OPA No. 57 of the Official Plan for the Township of King Planning Area), *Greenbelt Plan 2005* and the Oak Ridges Moraine Conservation Plan (ORMCP). The project is being planned under Schedule B of the Municipal Class Environmental Assessment (June 2000). The area for this project is shown on the **Key Plan**.

Environmental, technical and economic criteria were used to evaluate the water supply alternatives and the location of a water storage facility. The evaluation process has indicated that the recommended solution is to increase capacity at each of the existing wells in addition to a new well approximately 450 m south of King Road, west of Hwy 27 with a connection to existing watermains. An elevated water storage facility is to be located to the north of the community.

A second Public Consultation Centre (PCC) will be held to provide details on the evaluation of alternatives, the recommended water supply solution and to receive input and comments from interested parties. **PCC #2 will be held on:**
